

Special Information for Patients Receiving MR Contrast

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Gadavist is a gadolinium-based contrast agent indicated for intravenous use in diagnostic MRI. Gadolinium is the chemical name for a colorless dye which is also called a "contrast agent". It is administered through a vein by means of a simple injection. After the contrast is dispersed around the body it is soon naturally excreted by the kidneys.

The procedure for administering Gadolinium is similar to that of having a blood test. A tourniquet is placed around the arm; the skin around the injection site is cleaned with an alcohol pad before the injection. A venipuncture is performed, usually in the antecubital area, and then the contrast is administered.

Contrast agents will only be administered to patients when ordered by the referring physician and indicated to ensure the quality and interpretability of the diagnostic imaging examination

All patients receiving gadolinium will complete an appropriate health history questionnaire at the time of scheduling or prior to the commencement of their examination. The purpose of the questionnaire is to identify any potential contraindications and to determine if further laboratory testing will be required prior to contrast administration.

All patients are advised during scheduling to increase hydration for 12 hours prior to their appointment.

**The most frequent adverse reactions associated with Gadavist in clinical studies were headache, nausea, injection site reaction, distortion of the sense of taste and feeling hot.

Most hypersensitivity reactions to Gadavist have occurred within half an hour after administration.

Make sure any doctor or dentist who treats you during the next month knows that you had this medicine. This medicine may affect the results of certain medical tests.
